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A WORD FROM OUR DOM



Dear CBA Churches,

This month's Newsletter is dedicated to all the incredible Kingdom Building activities from this summer. We celebrated when our Youth of the association became involved in 3MT, Adults went on mission through Concord Builders and the children going to camp. MISSIONS CORNER: REFLECTIONS FROM OUR SUMMER MISSIONARY

This summer, I was honored to serve in the Concord Baptist Association as the summer missionary. During this 10-week internship, I had 7 major projects throughout the months of June and July.

My first project consisted of contacting each church in the CBA requesting information regarding service times. With this information, the days and times have been uploaded to the CBA church directory to allow for easy accessibility to those who are looking for a church.

The next project I participated in was Concord Baptist Church's Lift Camp. This was a music/drama camp for children in elementary and middle school. I was responsible for running recreation time for the younger group of kids. I also helped where needed during other rotations.

Next, I had the opportunity to teach the youth class at Vacation Bible School at Mt. Pleasant



Baptist Church in Clarksburg. This was a great experience for me as this was the first group I have ever taught. Throughout the week, I also assisted this group in crafts and music.

I was blessed to be able to serve with Mid-Missouri Mission Team (3MT) again this year for my eighth year. 3MT took place in a different setting due to restrictions from the pandemic. Each youth group worked in their own communities and joined in the evenings for worship at FBC California. During the week, I was responsible for checking supplies in and out to groups who needed them. When I wasn't checking out supplies, I spent my time helping the youth group at Russellville Baptist Church.

Corticelli Baptist Church held their VBS and requested my help as an adult supervisor for the 4th-6th grade students. During this, I followed the group to each station to make sure everyone was there. I even participated in some of the rotations, which were recreation, crafts, and a short lesson.

During the same week of Corticelli's VBS, I helped the Concord Building Team at Fortuna Baptist Church. The building team installed insulation and drywall for the youth additions to the church and gymnasium. I had the opportunity to meet and speak with many members of the building team and got to know some amazing people. On Thursday night of this week, I delivered a devotion to the team. At the end of the week, I created a promotional video for those interested in joining the building team next year.



Lastly, I had the amazing opportunity to serve as a counselor and recreation leader for the Concord Baptist Association Children's Camp. This year, the Association teamed up with Heart of Missouri Baptist Association and held a large camp of almost 100 kids at

Camp Cedar Crest outside of Mexico, MO. I spent the week fellowshipping with children and the other adults, participating in games, chapel service, and evening entertainment.

Serving as the summer missionary has been a huge blessing for me. Through these projects, I have gained quality experience with children and

THE ABC'S OF SALVATION

A – Admit

Admit what you have done wrong and ask forgiveness.

"All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23)

"The wages of sin is death." (Romans 6:23)

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

B – Believe

Believe that Jesus died on the cross and rose again as a payment for your sins.

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16)

"Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures." (1 Corinthians 15:3-4)

"But God demonstrates His own love for us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

C – Confess and Choose

Confess and choose to allow God to be in charge of your life.

"Then said Jesus unto His disciples, 'If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me.'" (Matthew 16:24)

"If you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord' and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you confess and are saved." (Romans 10:9)

"Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. Sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

If God has drawn you to Himself and you are ready to accept Jesus as Lord and the love He offers; say and mean the following prayer:

Dear God, I know I'm a sinner. Please forgive me of my sins. I turn from sin and turn to Jesus. I believe that Jesus is God the Son who died and shed His blood on the cross for the payment of my sins, was buried and that He rose from the grave three days later. Father, I want Jesus to come into my life. I want Jesus to be my boss and Lord. Thank you for saving me. In Jesus name, Amen.

THE JOURNEY SERIES, FAIRY TALES RETOLD BY JACQUELINE VAUGHN



We are taking a slight departure in our review this month and looking at a fictional series written by JacQueline Vaughn Roe, a graduate of Hannibal LaGrange University, currently living in Alabama. This series focuses on Rapunzel as she leaves her tower prison and embarks on a journey. This journey is a physical one but also spiritual as she searches for meaning in her life and a place to belong. There is quite a bit of reflection as she travels, giving the reader the back story of why she came to be with the witch who imprisoned her. There is a Christian element to Rapunzel's journey, not a strong one but it is there. As she travels, she occasionally encounters people who show her there is more to life than she is currently experiencing. When she begins, she has no concept of God or Jesus, having been raised by the witch. She starts from the beginning of awareness of God's existence and her need

for Him in her life. It is the third book before the spiritual pieces begin to fall in place for Rapunzel.

As a retired Elementary Teacher, when I began reading this series, I was expecting them to be geared toward elementary students, this is not the case. As Rapunzel journeys, the characters she encounters are from various different fairy tales. Some of them are well-known, The Goose Girl and the Twelve Dancing Princesses were immediately recognizable, and some are more obscure. Be aware these fairy tales, on the whole, are not the Disney versions we have grown accustomed to seeing in popular movies. Fairy tales in their original form are rather violent and often contain disturbing themes that make this series more appropriate for an older reader rather than a younger one. The Author uses some medieval words most readers will be unfamiliar with such as wimple, cotehardie, liripipe, surcoat to name a few. I knew what a wimple was, but the rest I had to look up.

To be honest, I understood better where the Author was going with what seemed to be an endless journey for Rapunzel after I read the discussion questions at the end of the first book. On the whole, I enjoyed books three and four more than books one and two because it is in book three that Rapunzel makes the decisions and choices she has been struggling with up to that point. If you are looking for a summer book club read or perhaps a family read, these books could generate some good discussion on searching for the meaning of life and our influence on those that pass in and out of our lives if you can hang in there until you get to the third book.

CHURCH HISTORIES NEEDED

The 200th Anniversary of the Concord Baptist Association is coming up in 2023. In honor of the occasion, a book is being written about the history of our Association, to include the histories of the churches that have been a part of it. Roy Dameron has been working hard to write this book for us, but the information that he currently has about churches is limited. In order to ensure that each church in our association has an up-to-date history included, we would appreciate your help to update your church's history.

Roy has provided us with some parameters in what he is looking for, regarding both information and formatting, which will help him as he puts them all together:

Parameters and Suggestions for the History of Your Church

Preferred format:

- "Word" document
- 81/2 x 11-page size
- One-inch margin on all sides
- Justify margins, except in explanation of references
- Times New Roman, 11 point headings, titles may be larger
- ¼ inch paragraph indention, no space between paragraphs
- Explain references (sources of information) on last page(s) of history with references in numerical order using Times New Roman, 9-point font

With every church using the same parameters, it should eliminate the need to re-type the history, and it will lessen the complications of putting them all together

Page One:

- Begin with three blank lines at the top
- Name of church centered in 16-point, Times New Roman
- Address of church entered in 12-point, Times New Roman
- Blank line
- By (your name) at the left of page in 11-point, Times New Roman
- Blank line
- Begin the history

Length of History:

It is suggested the history of your church be limited to about 3000 words (about 5 typed pages with Times New Roman, 11-point type). Contact Roy Dameron if it needs to longer.

Information to Include:

- Origin:
 - date, where (home, school bldg., etc.)
 - Names of 'organizers'
 - Names of charter members
 - Copy of the organization minutes, if available
 - First pastor name and photo, if available
 - Services monthly, or . . .
- Buildings:
 - Date built, kind (log, brick, frame), size
 - Photos of first (or early) church and current facility
 - Current location, address, contact information (phone, email, web site)

• Significant events, such as:

- Rules of Decorum, copy if available
- Church discipline practices
- Revivals, creek/river baptisms, dinner-on-the-ground
- Ordinations to gospel ministry
- Anniversary celebrations (50th, 75th, 100th . . .)
- Mission trips, events
- From ¼ time to ½ time to full time

• Effects of slavery and the Civil War, WWI, WWII and others

• Photos of:

- Special events
- Pastors serving 20 years or more
- Digital pictures are to be copied and pasted in the document
- List of all pastors:
 - Names and years served
 - Please denote pastors who were/are veterans of major wars (Revolutionary, 1812, Civil War, WWI, WWII, later)

Please reference everything. Why? At least two reasons:

- 1. It will authenticate the material; and
- 2. For use later, maybe years later, when another article, or updated/expanded history is written. Should the Lord tarry, your church will have a significant date in the future 50, 100, 150, 200 years old and should have a complete history of more than 3 or 4 pages written for the occasion. For example: Concord Church in Jefferson City will be only 50 years old next March. The history has been written of those 50 years and the printed edition will have more than 250 pages.

Past history

Your church history may be printed in *Historical Sketch of Concord Baptist Association and its Churches*, 1973. This may be rewritten, edited, enlarged as appropriate. Remember, it was written nearly 50 years ago. If you would like a copy of this, please contact Alicia at <u>office@cbamo.org</u> and she will get you a photocopy.

THE FOUR HORSEMEN, PART 2: COMPLAINING

"A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger." (Proverbs 15:1)

Last time I discussed criticism, one of the "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse". It's important to reduce criticism in our marriages, but don't confuse criticism with complaining. Complaining is telling our spouse what we do or don't like. A relationship without complaining probably has resentment due to unresolved conflict. That's why we need to be able to talk about what we want in a way that is easier to be heard. The idea in Proverbs 15:1 is that we can express the same desire in different ways and get vastly different results! Doctor Gottman refers to this as a "soft startup", according to him it has four parts:

- 1. Share some responsibility,
- 2. State how I feel...
- 3. about a specific situation,
- 4. State a positive need.

For example, Fred often runs late, it frustrates Wilma. She would wait at the door and let him have it as soon as he comes in: "You are always late! You never think about me!", etc. It goes downhill from there. For many of us, further description isn't necessary. We've seen this up close and personal.

But this time, she uses a soft startup. When Fred comes in and apologizes, Wilma says "Yes, you were late, but it's not the end of the world (part 1 above)." Fred, braced for the attack, almost falls over; he was expecting a fight, but Wilma didn't give him one! Wilma continues: "When you're late, especially for something important to me, I feel like you don't care about me or the things that I value (parts 2 and 3)." She has stated what she doesn't like in a way that is easier for him to hear. Finally, Wilma states a positive need (part 4) by telling him, "It wasn't like that this time, but there are times when it's really important to be on time. We need to talk about those. Would this be a good time, or should we plan on talking right after supper?" In this way, Wilma has deescalated a situation that would likely have turned into a big fight and scheduled a discussion about how they can come to agreement on time management. Of course, this will mean both must be willing to give some ground, it also means they must have the discussion when they agreed. I say that in case Fred is like me, he's ready to agree to a meeting later, but he does it hoping it will not actually occur!

In the example above, Wilma used a soft startup. As a result, she changed the tone of the conversation, which changed its outcome. Dr. Gottman says a soft startup is "the way we treat guests", that is, respectfully and courteously. Most of us do this when a friend calls, even during a moment of high tension. Though we're frustrated or angry, we'll answer the phone with a cheery "Hello!". If we can choose to change how we respond with a friend, we can do the same thing with our spouse.

Next time, we'll deal with Contempt, the second of the Four Horsemen.
